
Bishop Patteson: Martyr of Melanesia

John Coleridge Patteson was born in London, England, on April 1, 1827. He was the son of Sir John Patteson, a judge, and his wife, Frances. Patteson was educated at Eton College and Merton College, Oxford, where he studied classics and mathematics. After graduating from Oxford, Patteson decided to become a priest in the Church of England. He was ordained in 1854 and served as a curate in the parish of Alverstoke, Hampshire. 

Bishop Patteson's Legacy



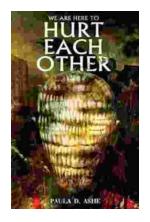

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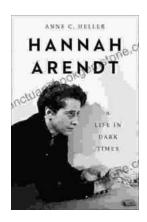






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
